1 OPENING

The Speaker requested Council to stand and observe a moment of silence.

She welcomed the Executive Mayor, Councillor Mpho Phalatse; Whip of Council, Councillor N Zungu, the Chair of Chairs Councillor L Phillips, all political party leaders and Whips; Members of the Mayoral Committee; Chairpersons of the Section 79 Committees; fellow Councillors; acting City Manager, Mr B Maduka; acting Secretary to Council, Mr A Gobinca; officials of the City of Johannesburg; residents of the City of Johannesburg and members of the Media to the 12th Extra – Ordinary Council meeting of the City of Johannesburg Municipality.

At this point, before quorum was confirmed, the Speaker said that after the opening, she would allow the Executive Mayor and the representative to please go outside and address the workers that were waiting for her address as administrators. She mentioned that the meeting will break for an hour and that VOG team and security were available and ready. They have been beefed up and security has indicated that they have made provisions to accompany the Executive Mayor and whoever is the representative to go and address their workers.

She stated that she had received a letter from the executives the previous night requesting the meeting to be moved virtually because of the strike. She did not exceed to the request because there was nothing attached that indicated how the employees that are in the building were going to be protected. She stated that she would have been happy to see a memo that stated that all the employees of the city were also not required to come into the building as her role is to see to it that all the employees were also protected and therefore the security measures have been placed to ensure that Councillors, including employees, are protected so that councillors are not above any other person.

The Speaker asked legal to check the quorum so that they can proceed to allow the Executive Mayor and the representative to go and address the workers.

Councillor Dlanjwa (EFF) asked the Speaker if she was not accompanying the Executive Mayor on behalf of the Legislature.

The Speaker in her response indicated that the workers had requested specifically for the Executive Mayor to respond to the administrative issues of the City of Johannesburg.

The Speaker informed Council that Councillors that had signed the register were 188, therefore there was a quorum. She urged Councillors who had not signed the register to do so.

She allowed Council a break for an hour to allow the Executive Mayor and her representatives to address the workers outside the Chamber. She stated that if the Executive Mayor required more time, she will make an announcement in that regard.

Councillor Deppe (DA) said that the responsibility of the workers of the City of Johannesburg is a responsibility of the City Manager, not of the Executive Mayor of the city. She stated that in her understanding, the acting City Manager went down there to address the workers and she was told that the acting City Manager has referred the workers to the Executive Mayor, which is totally unacceptable, the acting City Manager was supposed to address the the workers of the city.

After the break, the Speaker said that she got a report that the Executive Mayor had not gone out to address the workers. She stated that she gave an hour for the Executive Mayor to go and address the workers before the commencement of the Council meeting because she understood the importance of the workers and addressing their concerns. She proposed that Council proceed with the business of the day and security will advise if the situation outside worsens, they will then make a call on whether to stop the meeting or not.

3 RECOMMENDATIONS TO COUNCIL

Councillor Mosehla (EFF) requested the Speaker to verify quorum as some Councillors were still outside.

The Speaker requested Legal to do a head count and reported that the Councillors present at the meeting were 181.

MMC Sun (DA) tabled the executive reports.

Chair of Chairs tabled the Legislature reports.

Item 1 **SHORT-TERM LOAN FUNDING IN THE 2022/23
FINANCIAL YEAR FROM DEVELOPMENT BANK
OF SOUTHERN AFRICA ("DBSA")**

Councillor Machete (APC) stated that they do not support the report and requested that the Multiparty Government must indicate how it plans to repay the loan.

Councillor Magwentshu (ATM) stated that he was devastated to witness the largest City in the country being on the verge of financial ruins. He said the City of Johannesburg was supposed to be the hope of it's citizens, however it has been reduced to the state of pauperism by the DA-led government. He enquired how the City's financial constraints got to this level. He further enquired how long did the DA-led government know of the City's dire financial constraints and why was it only brought to Council now. Further commented that the DA-led government had failed to do financial forecasting, and this was a sign of incompetence which proved the DA's inability to govern the Metropolitan City like the City of Johannesburg, which carries the hope of many people as the economic hub.

He said that the DA-led administration had wasted the City's money on the never ending and frivolous court cases which had nothing to do with service delivery to the people of Johannesburg but political score settling. Alluded that Council was requested to approve a 2 billion emergency loan and asked to what end would Council be subjected to this incompetence by the Multi-Party Government. He said that Council should not approve the loan until such time the Multi-Party Government comes clean and transparent about the true state of the city's finances and what really happened with the City's purse.

He said the DA must tell the Council why the revenue department was not collecting money owed to the city from the big and wealthy businesses who owe millions and why the city was not cutting the services from those businesses. He mentioned that the money collected could provide services for neglected communities. He enquired who authorised the writing off from the municipal debts that were owed by a very reputable mall and medical aid company and who were the owners of those businesses. He said that the residents of Noordgesig were facing erratic billing system, and nobody cares to write off their debts.

He raised a concern with regards to the none-payment of SMME's and stated that Ward Councillors must now deal with the unpaid SMME's who are not paid by the city. He asked for the status quo of the non-payment of SMME's and of the City's debt book. He further asked who negotiated the terms and conditions of the loan; how did they arrive at the rate of interest that is JIBAR plus a margin of up to 3.04%, considering that JIBAR rate is constantly fluctuating. He asked if the city was receiving the best interest rate and if the city had put out a competitive process with other banks. He enquired what the plan was to repay the loan, taking into consideration that the loan must be paid in one instalment on 30 June 2023. He further asked what process was followed by the adjudication panel and asked if that report could be made available to Council as to how DBSA landed the loan.

Councillor Arnolds (AIC) addressed Council and stated that Councillor Magwentshu had covered the minority opposition parties. She added that the City of Johannesburg, under the DA government, was "lying" to the 6 million residents saying that the City's financial status was very healthy, and they were now asking Council to approve a loan that would take the City out of the red. She said she does not even want to elaborate on the issue of revenue because there is no revenue.

Councillor Rambani (DA) said the Speaker needed to be consistent as he was ruled out of order in the last Council meeting because he used the word "lying" and Councillor Arnolds used the same word, but the Speaker did not rule her out on that.

The Speaker asked Councillor Arnolds to withdraw the word lying

Councillor Arnolds withdrew the word "lying" and said that the DA government was telling the truth in a different way. She stated that the DA government said to the administration to go and run with the golden start, to go and spend on the golden start. She referred to her comments made at the Executive Mayor's State of the City Address speech, that it was not a golden start, but it was a rolled gold start that they had to run for. She mentioned that today, while Councillors are attending business of Council, they had to address workers who had not been paid their locomotive allowances and it was said that all is well in the city. She stated that the African Independent Congress do not approve the DPSA loan.

Councillor Nkosi (EFF) addressed Council and stated that the Economic Freedom Fighter was the only organization that consistently agitated for a State Bank and the emergence of black owned banks in South Africa. He further said that on the 27 May 2022, just a month before Council received a new budget of 77 billion in July, the DA-led coalition decided to apply for a loan for cash flow problems that may arise, and the DA advanced a hypothetical argument, far distanced from the service orientated approach for the residents of the City of Johannesburg. He said that it was absurd that the DA was trying to apply for money that they did not have. He further said that he was listening to MMC Knott saying that the loan was an emergency and reminded Council that the City of Johannesburg needed improvement before the city can apply for loans.

He said the city was failing in revenue collection strategies and not investing enough time to improve revenue collections. He further added that recently, the city had embarked on write offs and it was not putting effort in ensuring it minimized and eventually avoided write offs. He added that the write offs were just a small screen so that the City gets rid of its bad financial practices for the City to apply and qualify for these loans.

He indicated that the city had consistently shown that it did not have an effective strategic plan to reduce or avoid Unauthorised, Irregular, Fruitless and Wasteful Expenditure (UIFW), and that was a prerequisite as envisioned in the DBSA loan agreement. He referred to Section 5 of the contract titled "Conditions precedent for first disbursement" under Section 5.13 that read: "An undertaking to report to the DBSA on a bi-annual basis on Strategic Implementation Plan related to UIFW" and stated that the EFF have highlighted that in the Section 79 Committee and the lack of monitoring trends of the UIFW and the implementation of the analysis so that the city could come up with not only corrective actions but preventive actions necessary to pin these UIFW.

He mentioned that the DA was rejecting discretionary grants and asked why the DA was not utilising these grants to the benefit of the residents of the City of Johannesburg. He added that the DA had rejected the EFF motion that was recently passed in Council calling for all residents registered under SASSA to automatically be beneficiaries of such grants. He said that the DA lacked humane conscious to prioritize servicing the poor, downtrodden and marginalized residents, most notably the black residents of the city.

He said that the DA through the Executive Mayor, Mpho Phalatse, used the city's money to purge staff and shady appointments for example the acting Secretary's to Council, Mr Gobinca and Mr Molekwa debacle. He further said that the Executive Mayor, Mpho Phalatse had recently asked the private sector to invest 2 billion in Region G and asked why the infrastructure backlog was not being prioritized. He requested that the water crisis must be addressed, and the DA must stop pointing fingers. He mentioned the DA must call a media press briefing and address the situation of the City's finances. In conclusion, he indicated that the EFF was rejecting the loan.

Councillor Mokoka (ActionSA) addressed Council acknowledging that the municipality needed funds to be able to render services to its residents. She enquired what measures were being put in place to increase the revenue collection as it was clear that the target was not being met and as a result, the City was forcefully borrowing funds prematurely. She stated that budget was approved in May, over 5 months ago, this was an indicator that the city is skating on thin ice and it needed the MMC and her team to act quickly and swiftly. Therefore, requested that the MMC take the Council into confidence on her plans to turn around the low revenue collection rate and other plans that are at play should it be that they fail to collect revenue, given that the loan must be paid by the end of June 2023.

She reminded the MMC and her office of core principles that it must ensure that the municipality keep guard of and remain creditworthy. Noting that creditworthiness is a key to efficient and local government and Council ought to ensure that it borrows responsibly and fulfil their constitutional responsibilities. In her conclusion, she added that the MMC should strive to borrow in a context of long-term financial strategies which reflects clear properties and useful life of assets. She stated that ActionSA approves the report.

Councillor Rambani (DA) addressed Council highlighting that on the 25 May 2022, the MMC delivered a golden repair speech and 2 days later, on the 27th of May, the budget was approved and in that budget was a funding plan which was approved. He indicated that budget plan included the borrowing, which is the overdraft facility of the 675 million from Standard Bank and the 3 billion from any other financial institutions which included the DBSA to guard any cash flow eventuality for the City. Mentioning that the City of Johannesburg was the metro which relied in its own funding, and everyone knew that there are a lot of factors that has affected the low collection rate, including load shedding, and the war in Ukraine and Russian. He stated that he was very confident through the leadership of MMC Suddaby that the city would be able to pay back the loan and asked Council to approve the loan so that it can meet all its obligations.

Councillor Moosa I (Al Jama-ah) addressed Council rejecting the short-term loan funding in the 2022-2023 financial year from the Development Bank of South Africa because the loan will only bring the City to the brink of bankruptcy. He mentioned that the indictment to the city was that the loan had a higher interest rate, which is going to subject the city into a serious long-term debt and would take hundreds of years to pay it up. He enquired whether the City was in a financial crisis because they do not understand nor believe why the City was borrowing high interest loans if it was not in a financial crisis. He indicated that Al Jama-ah does not support the short-term loan for the 2022-2023 financial year. He placed on record his disappointment with the Executive Mayor and respectable MMC of Development Planning, MMC B Echeozonjoku who undermined the democratic elected Ward Councillors by going into their respective Wards without informing them. He called upon the Executive Mayor and the respectable MMC to kindly take note and please follow protocol and respect the Ward Councillors that have the heartbeat of the Community and prioritized service delivery to be foremost before political power and interest.

Councillor Marema, (ANC) addressed Council and said that in 64 AD, there was a great fire in Rome and when Emperor Nero was notified of the fire, he replied by saying he had enough water to mop the floor. He said the same could be said about the Executive Mayor of the City of Johannesburg, that when the ANC leader of caucus, Councillor Morero went to tell the residents of the City of Johannesburg that the City was in a financial crisis, the Executive Mayor replied on the national television saying that the City's financial state was doing fine. He stated that the signs had been there, the writing had been on the wall all along and the African National Congress had notified the multiparty administration of the financial crisis of the City even before they arrived where they are today.

He said that the city was broke hence the Executive Mayor is requesting Council to approve the DBSA loan. He further said that the DA says one thing in Council, and they say something different in the media platforms and in the public. He quoted Amil Cabral saying, "Hide nothing from the masses of our people, tell no lies. Exposed lies whenever they are told, mask not difficulties, mistakes, failures and claim no easy victory."

He indicated when they raised the matter of the administration rushing to spend more than what they had, in the name of golden repair, the administration ran to Twitter and social media painting a different picture. He mentioned that the truth was now in the open, that the City was not in a good financial condition. He stated that he was not surprised by the situation and referred to the City Ekurhuleni where bins had not been collected for 2 weeks; the City of Tshwane where Eskom had not been paid and that the City of Johannesburg is dirty with residents complaining every day but on social platforms the DA says the city is doing fine. He asked if they are governing on Twitter or in the real lives of the residents.

He concluded that the multiparty coalition government can fight the wave as much as they can, but the writing was on the wall that the city is in a financial crisis and the African National Congress is not going to be co-opted into approving loans to save the DA so that they go out and then tell a different story. He said that he wanted the residents of the City of Johannesburg who are following this Council online to know

why they are rejecting the loan because the DA was going to spin what happened to tell the residents a different story that Council rejected them to have money to pay their workers. He indicated that If the Executive Mayor went to the TV and said that the city had money, then they must pay their workers not with a loan.

MMC Suddaby (DA) noted all comments and concerns raised by Councillors and said that all Councillors are encouraged to exercise their elected duty to scrutinize and exercise oversight on all the financial activities of the City.

She indicated that the revenue department is fully operational in collecting revenue using the services of a war room and the City Manager is authorized in this application to negotiate the final and the best interest that will be of benefit to the city. She stated that accessing a short-term loan facilities that have been approved in the budget at this time of the year is not unusual and referred to 2013-2014, 2018-2019 and 2021-2022 financial years saying that all short-term loans accessed have been paid in full and on time, and this short-term loan will be no different it will be repaid by the end of June 2023.

She indicated that they were closely monitoring the grant funded projects to make sure that all of that money is properly spent to put the city in line to access even more. She concluded by asking Council to consider the report.

The Speaker put the question to the House if the report was agreed to. Some Councillors were agreeing to the approval of the report and some Councillors were not in agreement.

By a show of hands, the Speaker requested Councillors to vote on the matter and the results were as follows:

Yes – 81

No – 136

Abstentions – 0

Therefore the report was NOT APPROVED.


