1 OPENING

The Acting Speaker, Councillor Marema, requested that the Council observe a moment of silence for prayer and meditation.

He referred to Rule 7 of the Standing Rules of Council and read it as follows:

"Precincts of council

*7 (1) the precincts of council are the area of land and every building
Or part of a building under the legislature's control, including –*

- (a) the chamber in which the proceedings of council are conducted and the galleries and lobbies of the chambers;*
 - (b) committee rooms and other meeting places provided or used primarily for council's purposes;*
 - (c) every other building or part of a building provided or used in connection with the proceedings of council, while so used; and*
 - (d) every part of the buildings in which the chambers are situated, and every forecourt, yard, garden, enclosure or open space appurtenant thereto.*
- (2) insofar as it may be necessary, in a case where council or committees convene beyond the seat of council, these rules apply as if the premises where council or committees are meeting were within the precincts of council."*

He thereafter declared all venues where Councillors were connected to the precinct of Council.

Councillor Maila (DA) inquired about who was presiding over the meeting, noting that no notification had been issued to Councillors regarding the Speaker's unavailability.

Councillor Christians (DA) requested the Secretary to Council to read an updated notice indicating that the meeting was hybrid.

The Secretary to Council read the updated notice.

The Chair of Chairs referred the Council to Rule 19 in the Standing Rules and Orders of Council and read it as follows:

Acting Speaker

“(1) If the Speaker of Council is absent or not available to undertake her/his duties or needs to be relived during a meeting, the Chairperson of Committees shall be the Acting Speaker.”

He further explained that all municipal Speakers had been summoned to attend an engagement with the Gauteng Provincial Government. As a result, the Speaker could not attend the Council meeting, and he confirmed that he would be presiding over the meeting.

He then welcomed the Executive Mayor of the City of Johannesburg, Councillor. S Morero; the Whip of Council, Councillor N Zungu; all political party leaders and whips; Members of the Mayoral Committee; Chairpersons of the Section 79 Committees; fellow Councillors; the City Manager, Mr. F Brink; the Secretary to Council, Mr. A Gobinca; officials of the City of Johannesburg; residents of the City of Johannesburg; members of the media; and all ladies and gentlemen to the 32nd Extra-Ordinary Council Meeting of the City of Johannesburg Municipality

The Acting Speaker informed the Council that he had received a request, in terms of Rule 64(1) the Legislature had requested that he add an urgency report to the agenda as Item 6 and acceded to the request.

He further stated that he had received a request from Councillor Mashala for a debate on a matter of urgent public importance, in terms of Rule 98 of the Standing Rules and Orders of Council. The matter was regarding the water crisis in the City of Johannesburg. He explained that he did not accede to the request, as the matter was already receiving attention. The Environment and Infrastructure Services Section 79 Committee conducted an oversight visit on 16 October 2024 on the same issue, and a report would be generated and presented to the committee and subsequently to the Council.

The Speaker then allowed the Secretary to Council to conduct the roll call to verify the number of Councillors present and confirm the quorum.

3 RECOMMENDATIONS TO COUNCIL

The Executive Mayor addressed Council as follows:

“Greetings to the acting Speaker of Council; Whip of Council, Councillor Zungu; greetings to all Councillors and leaders of the different caucuses.

Speaker, let me take this opportunity to say to our fellow Councillors and the leadership of the administration through the City Manager, and our residents of Johannesburg. I thought it was important to raise a few issues as you know, a week ago, innocent lives were lost in Naledi, Soweto. Six children perished as a result of consuming poisonous food. We would like to take this opportunity to send our condolences to the families of the six children who have passed on, with the sixth child buried the past Sunday. We believe together with the law enforcement agencies, the communities and different departments of the city. In particular, the Health and Social Development Department. We will work tirelessly with other spheres of government to find ways of finding a sustainable and long-lasting solution to the deaths that we are experiencing almost every October since last and in the same area. It, therefore, requires all of us to work towards finding the root cause and address them once and for all. We ask God to help us to protect our nation.

Acting Speaker, it would be amiss of me not to say anything about the passing of the former Minister Tito Mboweni. I would like to acknowledge the son of the soil, whom I think deserves acknowledgement in this Chamber today, simply because Johannesburg became his second home when he came back from exile in the 1990s. On behalf of the City of Johannesburg, I want to also pay tribute to the former Minister

of Labour, the late Minister Shepard Mdladlana, who passed away peacefully at his home in the Western Cape. The two great South African remains a great inspiration, in particular to those of us who grew up under the harsh realities of apartheid injustices. We grew up during apartheid injustice, their dedication and servant leadership to the people of this country will forever be remembered. Indeed, the true two South Africans are indeed walking in the galaxy of heroes and heroines of the liberation struggle of South Africa, fought tirelessly for the creation of a non-racial united and non-democratic.

Acting Speaker, let me also hasten to say that the obligation to serve the people of this country in general and of course, the City of Johannesburg in particular, is prescribed in the Constitution, Chapter 7, which is dedicated to local government. This chapter spells out the following:

- 1. Status of Municipalities.*
- 2. Objectives of local government.*
- 3. The developmental duties of local government and lastly;*
- 4. The municipality's incorporative government, among others.*

Now, fellow Councillors, I'm invoking the Constitution that governs us a reminder of the collective responsibility we have as this leadership of this metropolitan municipality, in the light of the challenges we are facing as Joburg, which are worsened by the socio-economic landscape that is impacted by the mega trends that are emerging as well in our Province.

At this stage, acting Speaker, I would like to deal with the following issues, which are affecting us in relation to the water challenges and Gauteng as a province is facing a huge water challenge. Last week, on Thursday, I joined a meeting with Rand Water, Gauteng Mayors, and the Gauteng Provincial Government, included in that meeting was the Deputy Minister of Water and Sanitation. Allow me, therefore, Speaker to share the context of this emergency and what it means for our city. Rand Water extracts its raw water from the integrated Vaal River system, made-up of 14 dams, of which the following are the major dams of the integrated Vaal River system. I will not mention them in any way, except to emphasize that there are 14 dams at which water is extracting water, and two of them is the Katse and Mohale dams in Lesotho. Rand Water being the only bulk water supplier in Gauteng Province, has been given strict extraction limits which if not adhered to would threaten the water security of our Province. Rand Water has experience significant declines in shortage or in storage reserves over the past two years, and currently we are sitting at, the storage reserve of about 35% and this in terms of best practice, water supply storage system reserves should at least be at 60% to ensure that you can buffer against any possible system breakdowns, this capacity will not meet the demand currently experienced due to increasing water usage. Based on this premise, there is a need for all municipalities in Houston and especially Johannesburg to implement strict measures to reduce demand to avoid the potential crisis.

It is also important to paint a picture so that Councillors and residents are aware that Johannesburg consumes 1/3 of the total volume of water produced by Rand Water, municipal apportionment is about 1500 mega litres per day, and as of June 30, 2024, the city was consuming just over 1785 mega litres per day, and this steady increase in

demand is unsustainable and the bulk water supply is unable to meet the increasing demand of the City of Johannesburg. It is important to note that part of this uncontrollable increase is as a result, also of the illegal connections that continue to affect our water demand management. So, water storage reserves throughout the City of Johannesburg have declined significantly due to excessive water draw offs? The City of Johannesburg Water Storage was at 9 hours on the 17th of October, compared to the required at least 24 hours. So, this picture indicates the crisis at which we find ourselves in as far as water is concerned.

The City of Johannesburg is already receiving 19% of water supply above the Rand Water municipal apportionment and is still unable to meet the current excessive water draw offs. So, this concerns us quite seriously that we have to then make serious interventions in addressing the water challenges that we have. So, we have arrived at following decisions to try to mitigate against water losses and secondly, the general crisis on water demand management. We have taken a view together with Johannesburg Water, that we have revised our water conservation, water demand management strategy, which as you all know would have been approved in 2021-2022.

We are taking particular interventions, and this intervention refers to the following:

- 1. Repairs of leaking reservoirs in the tower infrastructure.*
- 2. Repair and replacement of bulk flow meters.*
- 3. Active or passive leak detection and;*
- 4. Project management.*

These are some of the core issues that we think will assist us in intervening but finally, considering the current challenges, ourselves into and Joburg Water are in the process of implementing the following additional short-term interventions. Of course, with the aim of reducing demand, which we think our Councillors should also spread the word in their own communities who will deal with by-law enforcement in prepayment meters areas to ensure that we can deal with bridging, leaks and all other issues related with the meters in the townships, in particular. We will deal with the removal of illegal connections from informal settlements and big business that tend to illegally connect and steal water.

Improve response time to pipe burst, at least from 48 hours to 24 hours. In that way, we will be able to act quite decisively in dealing with water losses and rehabilitation of pressure reducing valves, including reducing pressure on our valves. So, that is what we think, these 4 interventions in the main will be able to assist us quite extensively in reducing the crisis.

Lastly, as you know, we have already declared water restrictions at level one and we are looking at engaging with stakeholders in our internal legal department, to see if there are no changes, we will then be forced to introduce level 2 water restrictions.

With that said, Speaker, Johannesburg has the potential and we will turn around the water crisis and we hope that with the rains coming, it will also help us to reduce the challenges that were faced with. We are working with Rand Water to address the issues, especially in the South Hills in particular to ensure that we can guarantee a consistent and continuous supply of water to our residents, we also call on all our residents of Johannesburg to work with us in addressing these water challenges.

I, thank you, Speaker."

The Executive Mayor tabled the report of the Executive, and Councillor Raphadu tabled the reports of the Legislature.

MMC Masuku requested that Item 2 be withdrawn.

Councillor Lebatlang Z (ActionSA) addressed the Acting Speaker, inquiring about a motion for an urgent debate submitted to the Council and requesting clarification on the outcome of the submission.

The Acting Speaker responded by stating that he had already announced his decision not to accede to the request, as the matter was being addressed by the Environment and Infrastructure Services Section 79 Committee.
