1 OPENING

The Speaker requested Council to observe a moment of silence.

She then opened the meeting and extended a warm welcome to the Executive Mayor of the City of Johannesburg, Councillor Kabelo Gwamanda, the Chair of Chairs, Councillor L. Phillips, all Political Party Leaders and Whips, Members of the Mayoral Committee, Chairpersons of the Section 79 Committees, fellow Councillors, City Manager Mr. Floyd Brink, Acting Secretary to Council Mr. Andile Gobinca, officials of the City of Johannesburg, residents, members of the media, and all present to the 17th Ordinary Council Meeting of the City of Johannesburg Municipality.

A special welcome was extended to the Chairperson of the Provincial Drug Authority, Ms. Cheryl Pillay, as well as the newly appointed Councillors, Councillor H. Masera replacing Councillor C Homer from the DA and Councillor Mokome replacing Councillor Makhubele from COPE.

She extended her heartfelt wishes for a speedy recovery to the Whip of Council and the other two individuals who were involved in the shooting incident on Monday, 29 January, at Zakariyya Park. She further extended her sincere condolences to the families of the Rand Water Executive and the Protector who lost their lives in the same tragic incident.

Her deepest condolences went out to the families of the late Playwriter, Dr Mbongeni Ngema, and the renowned Anti-Apartheid Photographer, Dr Peter Magubane, who were both laid to rest recently.

The Speaker extended her wishes for a speedy recovery to Councillors Amod and Liebenberg, who were hospitalized. She welcomed back Councillor Brenda Dammie, who had been ill for a while, and said they are delighted to have her back and may she continue to enjoy good health and well-being.

She mentioned that there had been several disasters in the city, particularly in areas like Kliptown, because of rain floods. She requested Councillors to join her in congratulating Bafana Bafana for their victory against Morocco in the AFCON. She expressed pride in their achievement, as did the entire country.

The Speaker announced that she had received a request for an urgent debate on a matter of urgent public importance under Rule 98 of the Standing Rules and Orders of the Council. The request pertained to the delays in addressing and responding to the issue of hijacked buildings and ongoing fire eruptions, posing a threat to more lives in the City of Johannesburg. However, she clarified that she had not granted the request as it did not comply with the Standing Rules and Orders of Council and the response would be provided to Councillor Mthembu.

The Speaker asked Councillors to take note that the Executive had communicated during the Programming Committee Meeting that the Mayoral Committee would convene a meeting and might submit additional reports if deemed necessary. As a result, she has received a request to add three more reports to the agenda - specifically, Items 12, 20, and 21—and she has acceded to the request. These reports were distributed to all Councillors on time, along with the rest of the agenda.

She asked the Legal Advisors to confirm the number of Councillors present to ensure the confirmation of quorum. Additionally, she urged all Councillors to sign the register to officially record their attendance. The Legal Advisors indicated that there were 161 Councillors present in the House.

At this point, with the time being 10:15, Councillor Marema (ANC) requested a 20-minute caucus break, and the Speaker approved the request. The Speaker announced that Councillors should return to the Chamber at 10:35, not later than that.

On the resumption of the Council Meeting, Councillor Rahn (DA) addressed the Council, expressing concern that the Protocol had been instructed to close the doors to the corridor outside the Chamber. This was identified as a safety hazard because if Councillors needed to exit the Chambers, they would only have access to stairs and a lift for egress. She requested the Speaker to allow Protocol to open the doors, as Councillors often use that courtyard for making calls or taking smoke breaks.

3.1 Statement by the Executive Mayor

Addressed Council as follows:

"Thank you very much, Speaker of Council. Hopefully, I will be audible. It is always a challenge when I take the podium, Speaker, but I will try to be as clear as possible. Thank you, Madam Speaker.

Let me take this opportunity, Speaker, to greet you, the Speaker of Council, and to acknowledge Members of the Mayoral Committee. I extend my acknowledgment to the Head of Administration, the COO, the group CFO in absentia, and the Secretary to Council. I also want to acknowledge the political parties that are represented in Council, particularly those that form part of the Government of Local Unity.

Furthermore, let me acknowledge, Madam Speaker, our guests in the gallery, Members of the media, ladies and gentlemen, and the residents of the City of Johannesburg.

I do not know, Madam Speaker. Maybe I should congratulate the national soccer team, Bafana Bafana, for having won last night first. I think the boys played very well and they are making us very proud Madam Speaker.

Let me also, unfortunately, Madam Speaker, take this opportunity to acknowledge the affected residents in the City of Johannesburg as a result of the flooding that we have experienced in some of our regions. Madam Speaker, I want to express gratitude to the Ward Councillors and the Councillors in those affected areas for working closely with us to remedy and assist the households negatively impacted by these floods. I also appreciate the support we received from the administration, particularly the Regional Directors who were on the ground ensuring that necessary relief measures are deployed.

Madam Speaker, let me also indicate that we had an incident where one of our Councillors, Councillor Zungu, who is the Chief Whip of Council, was involved. He is currently recovering in the hospital. I will not go into the details, but I just want, on behalf of the City of Johannesburg, to extend comfort to the family of Zungu. Also, to register the fact that we are saddened by the incident and condemn the level of criminality and lawlessness. And the current behavior that we are beginning to experience in our communities. We wish him well, we wish him a speedy recovery, and I just received a report that he is recovering, Madam Speaker.

Madam Speaker, it is also important to note that as this administration, we understand the inadequacies and backlogs that result in unnecessary incidents affecting our residents. The MMC for Transport and the COO of the city have assured us that we will roll out a campaign to eradicate the causes of all these unnecessary floods that affect the households of our residents.

But thank you very much, Madam Speaker, and I would like to again welcome everyone to a new year 2024. Hopefully, it will be a productive one, and we will work as a unit to ensure that the City of Johannesburg prospers. Thank you very much, Madam Speaker."

5 (a) QUESTIONS FOR ORAL REPLY OF WHICH NOTICE HAS BEEN GIVEN IN TERMS OF RULE 105(1) OF THE STANDING RULES AND ORDERS OF COUNCIL

Councillor Ngoepe (ANC) withdrew both oral questions that were intended for the MMC for Environment and Infrastructure Services Department and the MMC for Transport.

Councillor Mosehla (EFF) asked the MMC for Transport a question for Oral Reply as follows:

PIOTRANS Company that operates the Rea Vaya bus system has been put under business rescue by the Gauteng High Court and the board of directors has been dissolved.

- 1. How will the business rescue of Piotrans impact the day-to-day operations and service quality of Rea Vaya buses?*
- 2. What measures are in place to ensure the continuity of public transportation services during this period of business rescue?*

MMC Kunene (PA) joined the Executive Mayor in congratulating and appreciating the performance of Bafana Bafana in their match against a country that does not see itself as part of Africa. It was indeed a heroic performance.

In his response, MMC Kunene stated that Piotrans continues to operate its business as usual. However, the two creditors decided to apply to the court to put Piotrans under administration or business rescue due to its inability to meet its obligations to pay the creditors. The move to put a business under administration or business rescue is implemented by businesses that see an opportunity for recovery.

He stated that the business rescue practitioner is a seasoned Chartered Accountant and a Forensic Investigator with significant experience in the transport industry, specializing in turning around companies. Furthermore, he mentioned that the business rescue practitioner would now assume the management of Piotrans, becoming the Alpha and Omega in its operations. He emphasized that the practitioner has the final word at Piotrans.

He added that the practitioner has a well-developed plan to turn around PIOTRANS and is making progress towards that goal. The worker's bonuses have been paid, and efforts are underway to make Piotrans cash positive. A contract with Marco Polo has been signed to supply buses needed to enhance Piotrans' efficiency in providing services to the citizens of Johannesburg.

He reassured that Piotrans being under business rescue does not pose a risk instead, it signifies a rescue mission. The 300 shareholders are expected to see improved returns, allowing them to provide better for their families. The Transport Department and the City of Johannesburg support this move expressing confidence that the business rescue efforts will lead to a turn-around for Piotrans, ensuring that there will be more buses on the road and refurbishing existing ones to meet obligations to the city.

In a follow-up question, Councillor Mosehla (EFF) expressed the belief that rescuing the bus company would serve the communities better, given the lack of transportation for citizens. However, he sought clarification on two aspects. Firstly, he inquired if the administrator or his team was reporting to MMC Kunene's office regarding the ongoing developments and the rescue plans. Secondly, he wanted to know if there are plans, with recommendations to the office to prevent the recurrence of past issues faced by the company.

In response, MMC Kunene (PA) explained that discussions are underway to formulate a turn-around strategy for Piotrans, including the operations of Rea Vaya services. These discussions involve the Transport Department, the City's Group Legal and Contracts, and the Business Rescue Practitioner. Report backs are provided to the City through the Office of the City Manager, has engaged a legal firm to liaise with the business rescue practitioner, ensuring proper briefing on every step of the rescue process.

He emphasized that the business rescue practitioner does not operate independently, however, continuous consultations take place with the city and the office of the MMC. This collaborative approach aims to ensure comprehensive and effective rescue efforts for PIOTRANS.

(b) QUESTIONS FOR WRITTEN REPLY OF WHICH NOTICE HAS BEEN GIVEN IN TERMS OF RULE 105(2) OF THE STANDING RULES AND ORDERS OF COUNCIL

The Executive Mayor indicated that answers to questions (question paper 018-2023 and question paper 019-2024) that were submitted for the Council Meeting scheduled for 31 January 2024 have been signed and loaded on the link.

Councillor Knott (DA) raised a concern regarding the responses to questions that were uploaded on a link, as they appeared as icons and could not be opened. She requested that the issue be rectified before the adjournment of the meeting.

6 ELECTION OF CHAIRPERSON OF THE COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT SECTION 79 COMMITTEE IN TERMS OF RULE 24 OF THE STANDING RULES AND ORDERS OF COUNCIL

At 11:15, Councillor De Lange (VF+) requested a 20-minute caucus break, and the Speaker acceded to the request.

On resumption, the Speaker stated that the election of the Chairperson of the Community Development Section 79 Committee would be done in accordance with Rule 24 of the Standing Rules and Orders of Council. In this instance, voting shall be by a show of firsthand on the basis that the aforesaid position is not part of schedule 3

to the Municipal Structures Act, 1998 (Act 117 of 1998) as amended. The procedure set out in this schedule applies whenever a Municipal Council meets to elect Speaker, Executive Mayor, Deputy Executive Mayor, Mayor, or Deputy Mayor or the Whip of Council.

The Speaker stated that she had issued the nomination form to all political party Whips, requesting political parties to submit nominations for the position of the Chairperson of the Community Development Section 79 Committee.

She further stated that she had received one nomination from Councillor T Nkokou (PAC), seconded by Councillor S Machete (APC), nominating Councillor J Mokome (COPE). The forms have been correctly filled and accordingly signed by the proposer, seconder, and nominee.

The Speaker stated that she had just received a nomination from Councillor N Mkhonza (ACDP), seconded by Councillor F Abdool (UIM), nominating Councillor R Harris (ACDP).

*Referring to Rule 24(2) of the Standing Rules and Orders of Council, she mentioned: "Election of Section 79 Committee Chairpersons
Political parties may submit nominations to the Speaker at any time before the next scheduled Council meeting."*

She further stated that since the nomination was received after the Council meeting had commenced, it cannot be accepted. Therefore, the nomination falls off.

She then requested Councillor Nkokou, followed by Councillor Machete and the nominee, Councillor Mokome, to read out their forms for the records.

In the absence of further nominations, Councillor Mokome was duly appointed as Chairperson of the Community Development Section 79 Committee.

8 MOTIONS

MOTION 1: FOR AN ASSESSMENT TO BE DONE IN TERMS OF UPGRADING AN INFORMAL TAXI RANK AND VENDOR SPACE AND FOR THE REPORT WITH RECOMMENDATIONS TO COME BACK TO COUNCIL FOR SUBSEQUENT CONSIDERATION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL

Proposer: Councillor J Horwitz

Seconder: Councillor M Louw

Councillor Horwitz (DA) addressed Council and tabled a motion as follows:

“Almost 50% of our citizens are unemployed. Our youth are most affected. Small and medium sized businesses play a major role in most economies but more so in developing countries. The World Bank states that SMEs account for most businesses worldwide and are important contributors to job creation and global economic development. They represent about 90% of businesses and more than 50% of employment worldwide. Formal SMEs contribute up to 40% of national income in emerging economies. These numbers are significantly higher when informal SMEs are included, which is the case in South Africa today.

Millions of jobs are needed now to combat the 50% or so of the unemployment rate right here in South Africa. This makes SME development a high priority for the DA. In my travels around my ward and Alex Township speaking to people who either have a micro or small business or would like to start one, two issues that stand out time and again. The first is not as you might think, startup Capital. No, it is space to set up a business and to trade from. The DA's policy for job creation is inextricably linked with its policy for SMEs. Supporting SMEs by providing infrastructure will make business easier, and more businesses that can employ people, the more jobs will be created.

For too many South Africans, the political freedom achieved in 1994 has not been matched with economic freedom. Defeating one out of every 2 South Africans who do not have a job, is the clearest and most devastating expression and consequence of this lack of economic freedom. Yes, the legacy of apartheid cast a long shadow. It continues to hold back many black South Africans from enjoying equal access to economic opportunities. It is one of the main structural causes of poverty and inequality.

That is why the DA supports measures to redress the legacy of the past. Provided they broaden opportunities beyond an elite band of beneficiaries, and which promote growth and jobs. No country can create jobs or include more people in the economy without economic growth. This insight informs the DA's plan for growth and jobs.

Without opportunity, there can be no economic freedom, and with that economic freedom society is matchless and fair. As we prepare to form part of government later this year, we will over the short and medium term, refocus and refine our economic priorities to create a nation of entrepreneurs by making it easier for South Africans to start and grow their own small businesses. We know of many huge businesses trading

internationally that started in a garage or a basement. People do not say as much about how a business started with no funding. This is why we need space and the location opposite the Edenvale hospital is an ideal space to set up a formal taxi rank."

The Speaker asked the Council if the recommendations to the motion were supported, and some members supported and some did not support the motion, therefore, the motion was debated as follows:

Councillor Louw (DA) expressed his support for the motion. He referenced the remarks made by Councillor Horwitz regarding the economic opportunities associated with the motion. He emphasized that there are more benefits beyond just economic ones. He believed that conducting the requested report should not be excessively costly and argued that it would be a positive step for many residents in the City of Johannesburg.

He also addressed the notion mentioned by Councillor Rafferty about the approaching "silly season," implying that during such times, they find opportunities to highlight what sets them apart rather than what unites them. He suggested that supporting the motion could serve as a unifying cause for the Council, allowing them to collectively work towards the betterment of Johannesburg's residents. He emphasized the importance of taking positive action for the benefit of the city's residents, aligning with the promises and commitments made by the Council.

Councillor Louw highlighted a common issue where new developments often lack consideration for necessary space, particularly for taxi ranks. He emphasized the importance of incorporating discussions to determine if such space is needed and, if so, where it should be located. He noted that informal taxi ranks are a reality and saw this as an opportunity to formalize them, providing shelter for people, including those visiting Edenvale hospital during rainy weather. He said that it was a humane action, separate from the economic opportunities associated with the motion, and appealed to the Council to support it as the right thing to do.

In closing, Councillor Louw extended an invitation to all present at the DA's Manifesto launch in Tshwane on February 17, 2024.

MMC Kunene (PA) expressed his opposition to the motion. He cited that the Transport Department has signed a protocol agreement with the Taxi industry, SANTACO and NTA. He emphasized the importance of this agreement in advising on the formalization of taxi ranks and interventions the city can make in the industry.

He stated that the vendor spaces have been taken over by illegal immigrants from Pakistan, Bangladesh, etc. He mentioned that before addressing the vendor spaces at taxi ranks, the city must first deport the illegal immigrants to prevent South Africans from competing with them for opportunities. He suggested funding young entrepreneurs to take over these spaces once they have been removed.

MMC rejected the motion, asserting that the city should rely on the expertise of the taxi industry rather than pursuing formalization efforts. He said that recent meetings with the industry did not indicate a need for formalizing informal taxi ranks. He concluded by urging the Council to respect time during caucus breaks.

Councillor Echeozonjoku (DA) expressed concern about the Speaker ignoring her when attempting to raise a point. She pointed out that the Speaker allowed MMC Kunene to continue speaking despite her attempts to interject, suggesting that this was indicative of silencing opposition voices.

In her response, the Speaker clarified that she had called Councillor Echeozonjoku's name, indicating that she had recognized her attempt to speak. However, despite this, MMC Kunene continued speaking, which may have led to the perception that the opposition was being silenced.

In her closing remarks on the motion, Councillor Horwitz (DA) emphasized the longstanding presence of the taxi rank across from Edenvale Hospital, highlighting its historical significance in the area. She questioned the decision to delegate responsibilities of the City of Johannesburg to the taxi association, expressing concerns about potential conflicts of interest. Additionally, she raised questions about the lack of transparency surrounding the agreement and why Ward councillors were not involved in discussions regarding the placement of taxi ranks, despite their intimate knowledge of their respective wards.

Furthermore, Councillor Horwitz agreed with the MMC Kunene's stance on deporting illegal immigrants, aligning with his earlier comments on the issue.

Councillor Meyers (DA) addressed the Council, expressing concern over a derogatory comment made towards Councillor Horwitz during her remarks on illegal immigrants. He requested that the comment be withdrawn, indicating that it was inappropriate and unacceptable behaviour within the Council chamber.

In response to Councillor Meyers' request to withdraw the derogatory comment made towards Councillor Horwitz, the Speaker asked if Councillor Meyers knew which specific Councillor had remarked.

Councillor Meyers (DA), responded to the Speaker's inquiry by stating that he did not know exactly which Councillor made the derogatory remark.

The Speaker responded to Councillor Meyers' statement by acknowledging the difficulty in identifying the specific individual responsible for the derogatory remark. She then asked Councillors to refrain from making such comments in the future.

In continuing to close the debate, Councillor Horwitz expressed gratitude to the Speaker and specifically thanked Councillor Meyers for his support and protection during the discussion. She indicated that she was unfazed by the derogatory mutterings from members on the opposite side of the Chamber.

She reiterated her stance on the deportation of illegal immigrants, emphasizing the urgency of the matter and rejecting any delay or passing of the city's responsibility. She stressed the importance of focusing on job creation as a critical need, highlighting the motion under discussion as an ideal opportunity to address this issue.

The Speaker put the motion to a vote and the results were as follows:

MOTION 2: FOR INSPECTION OF PIPE BLOCKAGE LIKELY CAUSED BY TREE ROOTS AT 6976 THOMAS MOLEPO STREET, RIVER PARK, LOMBARDY EAST IN WARD 81, REGION E AND CONCOMITANT RESOLUTION OF BADLY BLOCKED KERB INLET ACROSS THE ROAD.

*Proposer: Councillor J Horwitz
Secunder: Councillor S Rambani*

Councillor Horwitz (DA) addressed Council and tabled a motion as follows:

"The background to this motion is that River Park when it was built a couple of decades ago. The curb inlets and storm water drainage were not signed off at the end of construction and the result is that the Joburg Roads Agency has effectively ignored all requests for assistance to unblock drains and to maintain the curb inlets there. Now this drain, or this particular a curb inlet, is in the middle of a driveway and is blocked repeatedly.

We have had JRA out to unblock this curb inlet at least twice and both times the residents have come out to explain the problem and JRA officials have also discussed the problem with me, so it is through those submissions that I was able to determine that the main problem for this particular curb inlets seems to be that a tree has grown over where the stormwater drain was placed and the tree roots have in all probability growing through the drain, broken it and effectively has blocked the strand completely.

We have just had humongous rains and of course, we have flooding yet again. So, this is quite an urgent matter now because we need to remove the tree or somehow find a way to remove the roots from the stormwater drain. I would also like to mention that we had so few jet vacs at the time that the last unblocking occurred, there was exactly 1 Jetvac available for the entirety of the City of Joburg and I understand some additional Jetvac's have been bought in the meantime. And that was thanks to a colleague of mine's motion, a couple of Council meetings ago.

*So, I do thank you. I think that was Councillor Marema.
All I am asking here is for a formal investigation to be made into what is causing the blockage, whether or not this can be confirmed to be the tree, and if it is the tree to have the tree suitably removed or else to put in some sort of remedial action that prevents this storm water drain from blocking time and time again. Thank you".*

The Speaker asked the Council if the recommendations to the motion were supported, some members that supported the motion and some did not support it, therefore the motion was debated as follows:

Councillor Rambani (DA), spoke in favor of the motion. He mentioned that during the Speaker's query about the agreement on the motion, he observed Councillors Kunene and Marema and noted that they did not agree to the motion by reading their lips. He mentioned that the voting district in question was in Councillor Marema's constituency.

He highlighted the dire consequences of the blockage, such as children having to traverse it to reach school and nearby residences suffering from flooding. He urged MMC Kunene to reconsider his stance on the matter for the betterment of the community. He also stressed his intention to inform the residents of River Park that the African National Congress (ANC), the Pan Africanist Congress (PA), and their associates declined to address the pipe blockage issue.

Let us not be complicit to the dereliction of duties by our city entities but hold these entities accountable to their own mandate, for the benefit of our residents and in the interest of a functioning City.

For these reasons ActionSA does not support this motion.

Councillor Davids-Green (ActionSA), expressed opposition to the motion. She stated that ActionSA's stance is rooted in the belief in fostering a professional public service that prioritizes timely resolutions of service delivery requests.

However, she emphasized the importance of not condoning the failure of entities to fulfil their mandates. Instead, there should be adherence to escalation protocols already in place. She pointed out the existence of urban inspectors whose primary responsibility is to conduct inspections. In cases where service level agreements on turnaround time have lapsed, there are avenues such as submitting written questions to the relevant MMC (Member of the Mayoral Committee).

She cautioned against being complicit in the neglect of duties by city entities, advocating for holding these entities accountable to their respective mandates. This is essential for the well-being of residents and the functionality of the city. Consequently, ActionSA does not support the motion.

MMC Kunene (PA) expressed his opposition to the motion. He argued that the recommendations presented did not necessitate a formal motion. Instead, he contended that Councillor Horwitz should have followed the standard procedure by logging a service request like other residents of the City of Johannesburg, or alternatively, she could have directly communicated with him and MMC Magwentshu.

He highlighted that Councillor Horwitz had previously engaged with him, and he even visited her ward in response to her concerns. He reiterated his commitment to depoliticizing service delivery, emphasizing that his approach since becoming a Councillor was to prioritize efficient governance over political agendas.

Acknowledging the comments made by Councillor Davids-Green, he clarified that the issue raised by Councillor Horwitz was a matter that required a reference number and proper procedural steps, rather than being addressed through a motion.

The Speaker put the motion to a vote and the results are as follows:

FOR: 66

AGAINST: 150

ABSTAIN: 0

Therefore, the motion was defeated.
