US-EMBASSY SUPPORTED PROGRAMME:
FOSTERING PARTNERSHIPS AND PEER-TO-
PEER LEARNING BETWEEN USRG AND ENDGBV

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BACKGROUND CONTEXT

In 2021, the SACN applied for grant funding from the US Embassy APS program to fund a short-term project under the Urban Safety Reference Group (USRG). The project focused on the 'second pandemic', Gender Based Violence (GBV) in South African Cities. will be implemented with the NYC ENDGBV office as the funder requires that the SACN to partner with a US based organisation to exchange knowledge.

The project aims to strengthen cultural ties through knowledge exchange between cities in the USA and South Africa, specifically focusing on urban safety and gender-based violence (GBV) as a barrier to the economic empowerment and inclusion of disadvantaged groups, especially women and youth.

The partnership will focus on a series of USRG sessions to share the practices, approaches, systems and lessons learnt from the ENDGBV office with USRG members.



The Objectives of the session: The project aims to strengthen the capabilities of South African cities to leverage data to understand and combat GBV and to formulate appropriate evidence-based interventions. The aim is for cities to share experiences, exchange and learn from best practices in data indices, data collection methods, partnerships and evidence-based interventions, specifically the New York City (NYC) ENDGBV within the Mayor's office. The long-term aim is to strengthen learning and exchange between US and South African cities, underpinned by shared values.

PROJECT ACTIVITIES

The project involved four peer-to-peer learning opportunities allowing for knowledge sharing on how Cities can within their mandates provide services to GBV survivors, implement key environmental and programmatic intervention for prevention and mitigate against early risk factors to prevent violence in future generations.

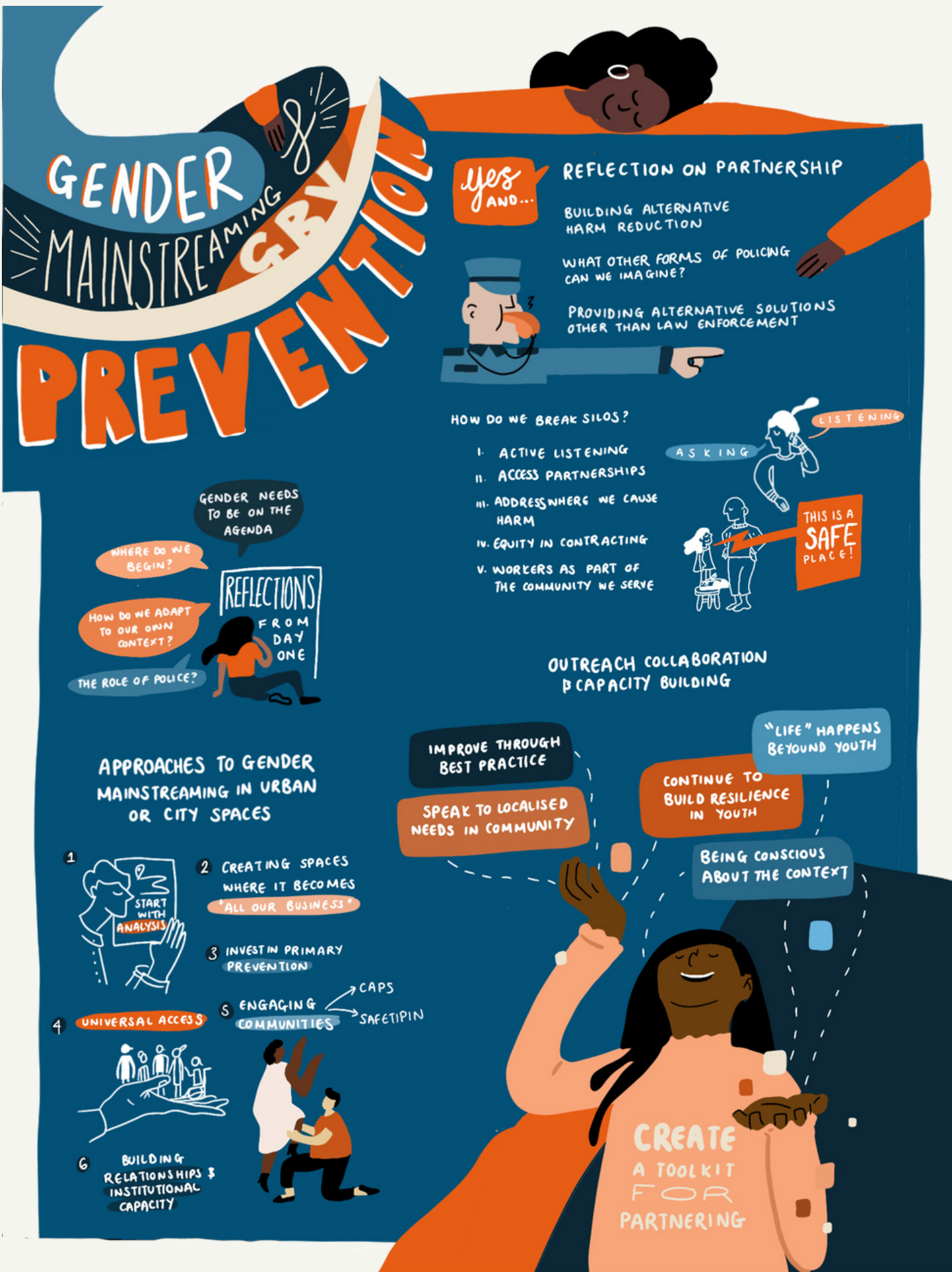

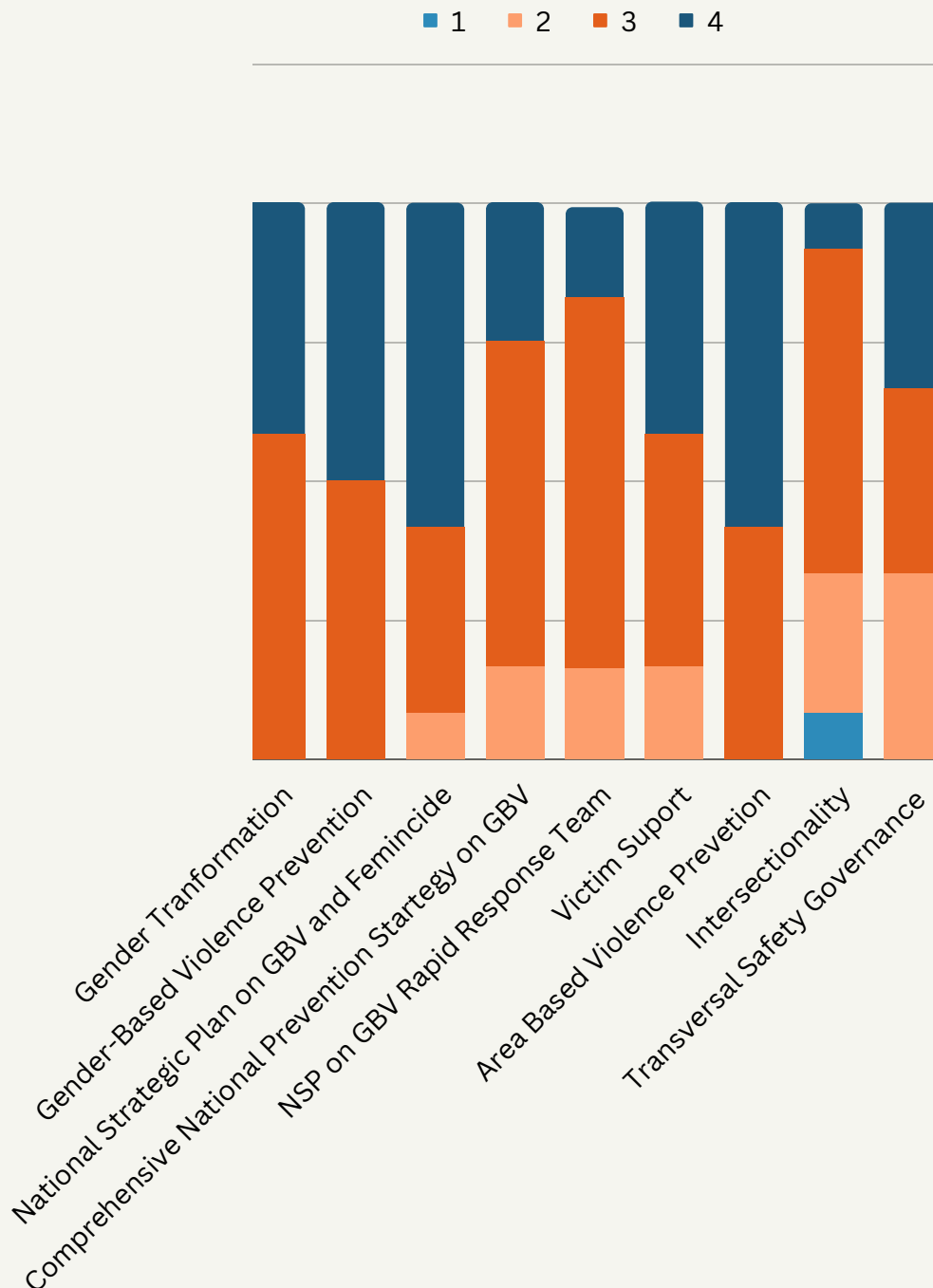

To be the best I can be and more to assist betterment of our society also keeping our streets safe for everyone.

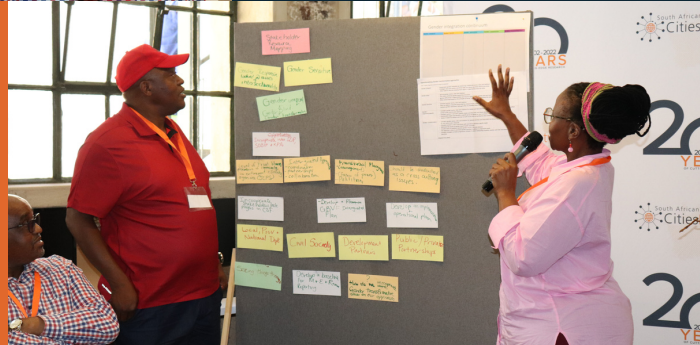
Its important to deal with GBV structurally, as an offshoot of historical violence and dispossession. Its daunting but possible.

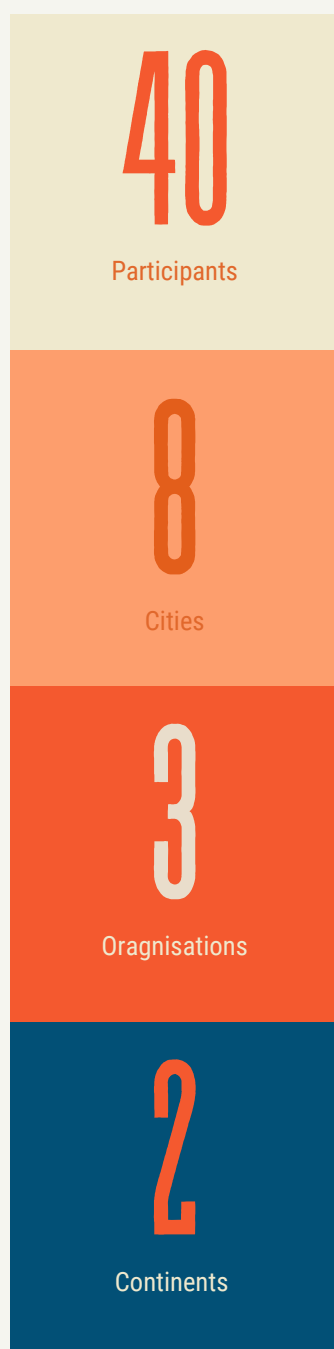
